Ukraine celebrated its <u>Independence Day with an elaborate military parade</u> through central Kyiv. U.S. Defense Secretary Jim Mattis was among the guests for the event, which included columns of Ukrainian forces and their weapons, along with troops from the United States, Canada, Britain, Poland, and other countries from the region.

Week's milestones. Independence Day Parade in Kyiv showed just how significantly the Ukrainian army has changed. A newly-installed TV tower in Bakhmutivka the Ukrainian government restored TV broadcasts across the areas of Luhansk region temporarily controlled by pro-Russian terrorists. Rada Speaker Andriy Parubiy vowed "autumn reforms" in Parliament.

Week's balance: LPG prices soar, state sector mired in losses, while Firtash comes into spotlight, again The National Bank of Ukraine this week continued to strengthen the hryvnia rate; the Ministry of Economic Development and Trade estimated the profits and losses of state companies for 2016; the prices of LPG set a new record.
